Executive Summary

District Boundaries

San Joaquin Delta College District is located in the central hub of the Golden State's cross roads and rivers. Positioned between HWY 99 and Interstate-5 and with the Calaveras River to the north, the San Joaquin River to the south, and the Stockton Deep Water Channel gathering them and providing the connection to the California DELTA waters and beyond to the western world.

The District's vast area of 2,400 square miles includes most of San Joaquin County and parts of Alameda, Amador, Calaveras, Sacramento, and Solano Counties. The District's first home is situated in San Joaquin County's City of Stockton, with other familiar named cities of the county like Escalon, Lathrop, Manteca, Ripon, Tracy, and Lodi. Other familiar cities within the Delta College District are Jackson in Amador County, Galt in Sacramento County, and Rio Vista in Solano County.

Bordering Community Colleges to Delta College are Chabot / Los Positas Community College District to the west, Los Rios Community College District to the north, and Yosemite Community College District to the southeast.

Making up the Public K-12 School Districts within the 2,400 square miles are Tracy Joint Unified School District, Lammersville Elementary, Stockton Unified SD, Escalon Unified SD, Linden Unified SD, Lodi Unified SD, Manteca Unified SD, Calaveras Unified (less Copperopolis and Salt Spring Valley), River Delta Unified (now part of Tracy Joint Unified), and Galt Joint Unified SD.

Vision Statement

The innovative spirit of Delta College will continue to guide us as an exemplary teaching and learning community, providing affordable access to high quality instruction, student-friendly services, and advanced technology to meet the needs of our diverse and changing communities. Our commitment to students and learning is central to our organization being a valued resource and leader in academics quality, cultural enrichment, and economic development. Economy

The District service area is a mix of urban / rural region. The area profile is that of a rapid growing population, expanding ethnic diversity, and relatively high unemployment. High rates of unemployment are seasonal for segments of the population due to the agriculture and resource extraction vocations. An added condition of the area economics is many residents of the area transfer into the region with low educational and English skills.

Within San Joaquin County, job growth is occurring in the areas of light manufacturing, distribution, food processing, and high technology manufacturing with research and development. The Tracy Depot and Lathrop's Sharp Depot Centers are being joined by the Safeway, OSH, Flemings, and other well known distribution centers. The larger population centers are experiencing significant increases in the number of support types of employment. Large retail names are expanding and malls are being opened at all the population centers where labor is abundant and housing is affordable.

Population

SJDCCD's service area is expansive and takes in parts of San Joaquin, Alameda, Amador, Sacramento, Calaveras, and Solano Counties. The majority of the student base is received from the cities of Stockton, Tracy, Manteca, and Lodi. Over the next twenty (20) years the County of San Joaquin combined with the surrounding counties will be experiencing a growth rate of 15% to 53% (see Table A). From this population Delta College can anticipate a reasonable increase in the student population over the next twenty (20) years.

The makeup of the population of San Joaquin County has been becoming more diverse, Hispanic and Asian / Pacific Islanders are on the rise with the White population decreasing. The movement of the higher percentage of non-white diversity will continue for the next couple of decades. The ethnic population changes reflected in Table B suggests that whites will make up only 45% of the County's population in 2020, down from 53% in 2000. In contrast, Hispanic and Asian/Pacific Islanders will out number Whites in San Joaquin County within two (2) decades.

Along with San Joaquin County growing at a fast pace, some of the cities served by SJDCCD are growing at an even higher rate (see Table C). Tracy, Lathrop, Ripon, and Escalon reflect a growth rate of over 31% over the past ten years. The City of Galt has produced the highest jump in population over the last ten years with 103% increase.



San Joaquin Delta Long Range Enrollment and WSCH Forecast, 2001



Workload Increase

Looking at the workload in terms of Weekly Student Contact Hours (WSCH), the Chancellor's Office reports an increase of 21% over the last fifteen (15) years. Plus, they forecast an increase of 35% over the next fifteen (15) years. The total projected WSCH will be 262,111 Weekly Student Contact Hours in 2013.

Capacity / Load Ratios

The State Chancellor's Office and the Governor's Department of Finance qualify facility projects for funding. The criteria utilized across the state for community colleges is the Capacity / Load Ratio. Every year the community colleges report to the Chancellor's Office the Report 17, which is the physical building capacities and room-usage standards.

Ratios above 100% reflect an excess of educational related space for growth, and ratios below 100% reflects limited or shortage of space. Fundability by the State is only approved for conditions that fall below the 100% benchmark.

Mountain House Center - Chronicle

San Joaquin Delta Community College District identified in 1998 the growth pattern and needs assessment of a new campus in the southern portion of the District. In 1998 the SJDCCD submitted a Letter of Intent to the State Chancellor's Office to proceed with the development and approval for the Tracy Learning Center (TLC).

SJDCCD and Tracy Joint Unified School District (TJUSD) collaboratively progressed on a joint venture with a 200-acre federally owned site as the priority location. Subsequently, a Needs Assessment and Request for Approval of the Delta College Center at Tracy was submitted to the Chancellor's Office in January 2000.

The Due Diligence of the project moved into the EIR phase and the findings were not advantageous to the proposed land use. Three underground pipelines located in the area were identified as a 36-inch and 26-inch high-pressure natural gas and one 18-inch high-pressure crude oil. Another finding was that the water was not adequate (City indicated they would provide). Revisiting the different findings, the District decided to withdraw their offer of the Joint Venture.

Immediately following this decision, staff was directed to look for alternate sites. Staff and Consultants returned to the SJDCCD Board with five (5) available locations for the southern center. Based on the comprehensive criteria and review process, the Board determined that a 125-acre parcel in the new Mountain House community would be the most suitable site for development of the center.

Delta's Mountain House Center site is approximately 114-acres in San Joaquin County and 11-acres in Alameda County. The new community called Mountain House Community is a 4,800-acre master planned community located about five miles west of the City of Tracy. The site is situated north-west of HWY 205 and Mountain House Boulevard (formerly named Patterson Pass Road) intersection.

The Mountain House Community will be configured with 12 different neighborhoods, commercial and industrial parks, a town center, schools (K-12), parks, and open spaces. The

mixed-use community is projected for 45,000 people at the completion of build-out. Police, Fire, water, sewage, roads, and a marina are some, but not all, of the amenities. The Mountain House Community was approved by the San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors in November 2000. Presently the water and sewer treatment plants are under construction.

Delta's Mountain House Center is planned to be developed in four phases over a twenty-year period.

<u>Phase-I</u> will consist of a self-contained core building. The beginning population of 3,500 students will have access to computer laboratories, library, multi-use lecture / laboratories, science laboratories, faculty offices, cafeteria, bookstore, assembly space, and teleconferencing center.

<u>Phase-II</u> is planned for 2012 completion and expands the student attendance up to 6,000.

Phase-III is projected for completion in 2017 with the student population rising to 9,000.

Phase-IV is pushed out to 2022 completion and a campus capacity at 12,000 students.

The District has prepared this new Master Plan for the Mountain House Center along with a supplemental environmental review and supplemental specific plan with the County to update the existing EIR. SJDCCD has started the acquisition process and a revised Letter of Intent to establish the new Delta College Center at the Mountain House site was submitted to the Community College Board of Governors (BOG) and the California Postsecondary Education Commission (CPEC) in April 2001. This action was followed by a new revised Needs Assessment and Request for Approval.

Public hearings by the BOG and CPEC were started in September 2001 and the District is looking forward to approval in the spring of 2002.

Priorities - Proposed Facility Projects

Microscopy Technology Center (MTC) - Priority #1

This project is mentioned only as a work in-progress. The new MTC construction cycle is forging ahead and completion is projected in late fall of 2002. This \$6,771,000.00 building is one of the most unique in the Community College community. The 12,500 assignable square-foot (asf) building is designed for housing 8 to 10 of today's high-end sensitive microscopes utilized in all types of manufacturing or R&D work. The building will double the Weekly Student Contact Hours (WSCH) from 468 to over 900.

Safety-Electrical Systems Replacement - Priority #2

Preliminary Plans and Working Drawings were approved for 2001-2002 and have been progressing as scheduled. The Working Drawings will be started as soon as approval is received from CCCCO. The \$2,700,000.00 funding is requested in the Governor's 2002-2003 by the State Community College Chancellor's Office.

This project addresses the safety and capacity needs for Delta's 30 + year old buildings and their electrical short-falls. The electrical distribution systems of the main instructional buildings on campus have reached their capacity. The overloaded conditions are at times bordering on the safety limits of the system. This project design is the final scope of work to place new dependable power into the classrooms and remove the safety issue.

Construction documents should be completed in 2002 with the construction period to be completed in 2003-2004.

Delta Center at Mountain House - Phase #1 - Priority #3

\$30,000,000 for the first phase of the new campus located in the Mountain House Community. These funds will address the planning, construction, on-site infrastructure, and off-site infrastructure for the center. The District has committed to acquire the property (\$3,800,000) and to the construction (\$36,000,000) of items which are not funded by the State. These items include infra-structures, parking lots, and utilities over-sized for growth / expansion.

The District is also considering a local bond in the near future. The original IPP was submitted January 2000 to the CCCCO.

This Project of expansion in the southern portion of the District was explained on page 6-9 of this summary. The growth in population in the effected areas of Tracy, Manteca, and Lathrop combined with the forecast of 315,000 people in 2010, has triggered the focus of SJDCCD to start the planning required by our communities and the charge for the educational service.

The present Service Centers of Manteca Farm Center, Tracy Learning Center at West High appear to be meeting today's student demands. Evaluating the increasing numbers of new homes, businesses, and expansion in the area, it is important and clearly justified for Delta's expansion.

As mentioned earlier, the District reviewed different sites and selected the planned Mountain House Community for this project. This community is now fully approved by San Joaquin County. Negotiations and the EIR are currently underway for the 125-acre site.

Phase-I of this project includes space (57,768 asf) for lecture / laboratory classrooms, computer and science laboratories, offices, library, learning resources computer laboratory, bookstore, food court, and teleconferencing studios. The project also includes off-site and on-site infrastructure systems including a central mechanical system and maintenance building.

Planning would start in 2004 and construction would be completed in 2007.

Maintenance & Warehouse Complex - Priority #4

The District is requesting \$6,000,000 for the total project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) for planning and construction of a new support complex for the maintenance, transportation, grounds, custodian, purchasing, warehousing, and computer / audio-visual equipment repair shop. This new complex would be located in the north section of campus and removed from students and the educational programs. The complex would fulfill the complete campus concept, Delta was never provided the complete campus or permanent housing / location for these services.

The complex would consist of the main building, fenced compound, bus-fleet repair building, employee parking lot combined with the fleet-parking, fleet check-out & in area, drystorage/holding building, and recycling components.

Planning would start in 2003 and construction would be completed in 2005.

Danner Student Services Center - Phase-I - Priority #5

The District is requesting \$4,000,000 for the total project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip this project. This project consists of approximately 20,089 gsf (13,057 asf) and converts the basement of the Danner Center into the Danner Student Service Center Phase-I. The area is being vacated by the Purchasing, Maintenance, Transportation, and Custodian Divisions as described in Priority #4.

The Second phase for the Student Services Center (Phase-II) will be contingent on the existing Goleman Building functions being relocated to a new Learning Resource Center (Priority #7). Phase-II will occupy 8,000 asf and the remaining 5,057 asf will be occupied by Community Services Offices.

Existing Student Services and Assessment Departments are scattered in various locations across campus. Students are experiencing difficulty in locating these resources. The possibility of losing students due to the difficult, confusing, and flustered condition needs to be corrected by this project.

Delta's Staff has recognized the importance "Central Accessible Services" for the students (entering and retaining). The Student Services and Assessment Programs have established coordinated goals to centralize their services and programs into a "One-Stop" Student Services and Assessment Center. Danner Hall may be the most feasible location for the new center.

Planning would start in 2003 and construction could follow the exiting of the existing Divisions in 2005.

Space Efficiency Project - Priority #6

The District is requesting \$1,750,000 for reconstruction and consolidation of existing laboratory and shop space at various locations on the Delta Campus to meet future program needs

and improve the efficient use of space. The vacated space would be made available for growing instructional and support programs.

Planning (IPP submitted January 2000) would start in 2003 and construction would be completed in 2005.

Learning Resource Center - Priority #7

Delta is requesting \$15,000,000 for the total project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip a new Learning Resource Center on the Stockton Campus. This Center would provide the College and the educational community with a new high-technology library and learning resource center.

The District is considering requesting voter approval of a local bond measure to also share in the project costs.

Delta College is presently in need of library space (30%) to meet the needs of the growth rate. With the construction of 10,500 asf of library space at the Mountain House Center, Delta's shortage will still be reduced to only 18% in 2007-08. Moving beyond 2007, the District will be experiencing more increases in shortage of library space.

Goleman Student Center - Phase II - Priority #8

The District is requesting \$2,000,000 for the total project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip a new Goleman Student Services Center on the Stockton Campus.

As stated earlier, the Second phase for the Student Services Center (Phase-II) will be contingent on the existing Goleman Building functions being relocated to a new Learning Resource Center (Priority #6). Phase-II will occupy 8,000 asf and the remaining 5,057 asf will be occupied by Community Services Offices.

Existing Student Services and Assessment Departments are scattered in various locations across campus. Students are experiencing difficulty in locating these resources. The possibility of losing students due to the difficult, confusing, and flustered condition needs to be corrected by this project.

Delta's Staff has recognized the importance "Central Accessible Services" for the students (entering and retaining). The Student Services and Assessment Programs have established coordinated goals to centralize their services and programs into a "One-Stop" Student Services and Assessment Center. Danner Hall may be the most feasible location for the new center.

Planning would start in 2003 and construction could follow the exiting of the existing Divisions in 2005.

Emergency Generator(s) - Priority #9

The District is requesting \$2,000,000 for this project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip the complete campus with Emergency Power for all facilities on the Stockton Campus at 100% of load. This project will allow for the educational programs to continue without disruption from utility service brown-outs or times of loss.

Presently the only emergency power is connected to the lighting of hallways, stairwells, and some open areas. The elevators in each building will only travel to the bottom floor (by bleeding-off ram) and does not allow for removing special-need students and staff members off the upper floors (presently hand carried).

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning in 2005 with the construction completion around the 2007.

Culinary Arts Building - Priority #10

The District is requesting \$6,000,000 for the total project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip a new Learning Resource Center on the Stockton Campus. The Culinary Arts Project will provide for the educational delivery space presently lacking in the Danner Center.

The vision of the Culinary Arts Building is to provide a facility that will combine the educational and retail needs for the proper efficiency of labor and food product. The Culinary Arts

Program space needs will be a combination of receiving, storage, pre-prep, staging, production, and delivery. All of these functions will be connected to accounting, health & safety, point-of-sales controls, and customer service.

This building is a stand-alone structure with adequate access for delivery, parking for staff and public, and location best suited for drop-in customers.

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning would start in 2004 and construction could follow the exiting of the existing Divisions in 2008.

Amphitheater - Priority #11

The District is requesting \$1,000,000 for this project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip an Amphitheater on the Stockton Campus. Delta College music program is experiencing increasing enrollment and desire to expand their program with this project. The project would construct a 250-fixed seat amphitheater to facilitate outside performances. An acoustical shell, lighting system, and sound system would be provided in this project. Landscaping would provide for over-flow and traffic control / safety.

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning in 2005 with the construction completion around the 2007.

Refurbish all Labs - Priority #12

The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip the complete campus labs with new, state of the art, lab components, and other building entities required to support the new / remodeled facilities on the Stockton Campus.

Examples of modernization items include, but are not limited to, fume hoods, metal & plastic welding / cutting, chemistry

environmental stations, and other entities deemed necessary at the time.

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning in 2005 with the construction completion around the 2007.

<u>Additional Restroom Facilities - Priority #13</u>

The District is requesting \$2,000,000 for this project. The Local Contribution and State funds would be used (50/50) to plan, construct, and equip the needed components, and other building entities required to support the new / remodeled restroom facilities on the Stockton Campus.

This project would construct new or modernize / convert existing space into ADA Restrooms. The Delta Campus was built almost thirty years ago and over time the Uniform Plumbing Code and ADA requirements have changed.

In 2002, Delta and the State completed an ADA Barrier Removal Project which reduced the total number of waterclosets due to the design criteria of Federal & State Laws. Areas of needs will be evaluated and value-engineering during the design phase will help maximize the funding.

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning in 2005 with the construction completion around the 2007.

Manteca Regional Center (Planning & Portables) — Priority #14

The District is requesting a total of \$5,000,000 for this project. The Local Contribution (\$4,000,000) and State funds of \$1,000,000 to plan, construct, and equip the needed components, and other building entities required to support the new / remodeled facilities on the Manteca Site.

This project is the foundation and design criteria for the roll-in of the College's vision and support for the growth and changes in central California industries and our educational community needs.

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning in 2005 with the construction completion around the 2007.

Lodi / Galt Regional Center (Phase #1) - Priority #15

The District is requesting a total of \$5,000,000 for this project. The Local Contribution (\$4,000,000) and State funds of \$1,000,000 to plan, construct, and equip the needed components, and other building entities required to support the new / remodeled facilities on a Lodi / Galt site that is to be determined.

This project is the foundation and design criteria for the roll-in of the College's vision and support for the growth and changes in central California and our educational community needs.

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning in 2005 with the construction completion around the 2007.

Mother Lode Regional Center (Planning & Portables) — Priority #16

The District is requesting a total of \$5,000,000 for this project. The Local Contribution (\$4,000,000) and State funds of \$1,000,000 to plan, construct, and equip the needed components, and other building entities required to support the new / remodeled facilities on a Mother Lode site that is to be determined.

This project is the foundation and design criteria for the roll-in of the College's vision and support for the growth and changes in north-east areas of SJDCCD and our educational community needs.

Delta is also considering placing this project on a local general bond measure to share the costs of this project.

Planning in 2005 with the construction completion around the 2007.
